Think about it this way: their minds are wide open like a large pot of flowers. Every word you say becomes a seed planted in their minds. By the time children reach their preteens, their minds are more like the narrow opening of a bottle of soda. They do not receive and accept as much, or as easily, as they did the first ten years of their lives. Remember, you only get one shot at it!


"Unconditional Love"

While our younger daughter was playing with her toys in the bathroom sink, I came in to find water all over the floor. She turned and looked at me, and for a quick instant, I saw a look of worry in her eyes. I said to her, "Rachel, you made a big mess, but I still love you!" Her facial expression relaxed, and she smiled. Soon after, she began affirming it for herself. As I was scolding her later that week, she clasped her tiny hands and stuttered, "but, but mommy, you still love me??" I took her in my arms and told her, "I will always love you, no matter what, no matter how big the mess, I will always, always love you. Triple dose your children with unconditional love.

"Etiquette"

A place to start teaching your children to succeed is in the area of manners and etiquette. At a very young age, both girls knew to hold out their hand and politely say, "Nice to meet you," while looking into the eyes of the person we would introduce to them. The adults they met would respond with praise and positive comments. When their friends would have dinner at our home, we taught them to wait for the host to take her first bite. I love to remember all their eyes watching me as they waited for the signal to eat. Good etiquette breeds compliments and compliments breed self-confidence. Etiquette is a prerequisite in nearly all aspects of life, both personal and professional. It should become second nature to your children as they grow up.


